ne of our children posed a question to me last week: Is Donald Trump a Christian? The same might be asked of any of us: Is he/she a Christian? The starting point for any response is that God

alone knows our hearts, knows what we really believe and how we really live, for it is not enough to say, "I am a Christian" or "I believe in Jesus," if our lives do not reflect the values Jesus taught. In his book *How My Mind Has Changed* Stanley Hauerwas tells this story:

A team of evangelical Christians invaded Shipshewana, IN, to bring the lost of Shipshewana to Christ. In front of Yoder's dry goods store, one of these earnest souls confronted a Mennonite farmer with the challenge, "Brother, are you saved?" The farmer was stunned by the question. All his years of attending the Peach Bloom Mennonite congregation had not prepared him for such a auestion, particularly in front of Yoder's. Wanting not to offend, as well as believing that the person posing the question was of good will, he seriously considered how he might answer. After a long pause, the farmer asked his questioner for a pencil and paper and proceeded to list the names of ten people he believed knew him well. Most, he explained, were his friends, but some were less than that and might even be enemies. He suggested that the evangelist ask these people whether they thought him saved since he certainly would not presume to answer such a auestion on his own behalf.

Is he/she a Christian? What might others – friends and less than friends – say about us or about Donald Trump or about any other candidate with regard to that question? Do we live as Christ calls





Nursing Nook with Kathy Henderson, RN



Quick quiz: How do we know winter is actually here? Sit in our sanctuary any Sunday morning and listen for the multitonal chorus of stifled coughs and sniffles punctuating hymns, pray-

ers and John's sermons. It begins quietly in mid-October, tends to reach its crescendo in mid-February, and fades quietly into allergy season in late spring.

Thus, the annual reminder to "Cover That Cough!" "Sneeze into a tissue!" "Wash your hands more often than you think necessary!" "Use the hand sanitizer just outside the sanctuary doors!" And please, please stay at home if you are not feeling well.

Almost 43 million people got sick during the 2018-2019 flu season; 61,200 people died and 647,000 were hospitalized, the CDC reports. Although the CDC considers that an "average" flu-cold season, many are predicting a nastier-than usual season this year.

A few preventative steps can go far in helping calm that congregational cough:

- Be aware that colds and flu can be confused in their early stages, so;
- Please get your flu shot now;
- Stay hydrated;
- Remember that anything that comes in contact with (or close to) a person's mouth can transfer germs. (Unwashed hands are a frequent culprit.) Clean your phones, door knobs and children's toys, change toothbrushes often and be wary of sharing scarves. (Both cold and flu viruses survive for many hours on non-porous surfaces.)
- Wash your hands as soon as possible after blowing your nose; cough into a tissue or your elbow, or – even more effective – down your shirt!

While we are hard at work formalizing our plans for the community development centers and dialoging with experts in the various fields that are relevant to our proposed work, we also keep our hearts open to opportunities the Lord brings our way to serve others and share the Gospel right where we're at.

At the end of September, Crystal was asked to help train teachers at a Montessori school here in Abuja. She was later invited to offer a similar training for a church that runs three different schools in the capital, one of which is for disadvantaged children. Many schools are in need of such trainings for their teachers, but cannot afford facilitator fees. We are happy that we can offer this service to them free.

On a daily basis, Raph is out in the community—whether interacting with customers in his bustling office or hanging out at the mechanic shop with our car, he is afforded many opportunities to share the Gospel and to confront many of the false and harmful doctrines being preached in many Nigerian churches. He often comes home with stories of the conversations he's had and the seeds he's planted.

Please pray for us to be faithful and bold to take each opportunity God sends our way.
