

Connect with the Pastor

Following last Sunday's virtual worship service someone asked, "What was that black box behind the baptismal font? Was that part of the improved sound system?" It may have looked like a speaker (and we are glad that the sound is much improved for our virtual services), but that black box is an air purifier that uses ultraviolet light to help purify the air in the sanctuary. Another sits in the choir loft and yet another is being used in our preschool area. Along with a boatload of hand sanitizer, disposable masks, cleaners, and touchless thermometers, these air purifiers are part of the new reality of being a church in the midst of a pandemic. The same might be said for the technology we now use to broadcast the worship service on Facebook Live and to meet for Bible Study and youth activities via Zoom. Over these past months, we have had to find new ways of doing things in order to continue ministry in the midst of COVID-19.

Across the centuries, churches have had to adapt to a host of new realities. Some of those adaptations are technical (like air purifiers) and some of them are theological (hence the Reformation) and some of them are ecclesiastical as together we try to be relevant and faithful as the church in the cultural context in which we live. The Reformers described us as being "a church Reformed and always being reformed" by the Spirit. That is to say, we are rooted in our Reformed heritage, but we must grow and change as the Spirit leads us. That change is often not easy, especially among Presbyterians! There is a reason that the response to "How many Presbyterians does it take to change a light bulb?" is "None. My grandmother gave us that light bulb!" But some light bulbs need changing, and if we are to be faithful to God's call, then we must be open to change, to the new things God is doing in our midst!

In this unusual, viral stewardship season consider all the changes in your life? How has God been at work in the midst of it all? This Sunday in worship, three of our folks will share their perspectives on where they have seen God in the midst of this pandemic in their lives. Perhaps their stories will inspire you to recognize God's active presence in your life too. For God is here with us not only to support and strengthen us, but also to lead us on some new paths in new ways to be the faithful disciples that God calls us all to be!





Lament: We're Better Together

Lesson two in our Bible Study is about our strength when we are in community. A community is where we share our experiences or learn about the experiences of others. A community is where we join our voice with that of others combining our energy and resources with others.

Many of the writings of the Psalmist are about the community's lament. (See Psalms 44, 74, 79, 80 and 81). These are addressed to God crying out to God against injustice and inequality. What shall the community do? Lament. That is, *name* the injustice or evils. *Name* those who perpetrate inequality or injustice. *Ask God* to show up and do something. And *then, remember* who gave you eyes to see and a voice to speak up. Remember who gave you life so that you could be an advocate for others.

"You are all God's children through faith in Christ Jesus. All of you who were

baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ." (Galatians 3:26–27) You might rightly say that the injustices and inequalities are too many or too ingrained or too challenging and that it is difficult to know where or how to begin. Some ideas:

- ◆ Donate to one effort
- ◆ March when given the opportunity
- **♦ Commit** to long-term engagement
- ◆ Contribute to the greater good
- ◆ Be part of a community that joins voices and energy

OUTREACH CONTINUES

Boys and Girls Club —

We continue to participate in the Nextrex Program, collecting plastic bags for a park bench. 500 pounds = 1 bench. Collect your bags and bring to the church office vestibule to drop in a designated receptacle, or drop off at RefillRenew, 110-1 Baldwin Street. Also, we need volunteers to help with taking the bags collected at the church to Food Lion. Volunteers will need to weigh the bags (there is a luggage scale next to the receptacle at the church), advise Robyn of the weight, and drop bags off at Food Lion. Donate supplies to Boys and Girls Club: school supplies (especially dry erase pens, lined paper, Kindergarten lined paper, pencils, crayons, and colored pencils). Look for a drop off box in the church office vestibule.

Shelburne Project –

We continue to collect toiletry items and non-perishable food items for Shelburne Middle School families. The hygiene items and nonperishable foods will always be useful, but we are also collecting school supplies . . . items such as backpacks, hand sanitizer, and binders . . . to have on hand for students for school. FYI . . . as far as serving our kids . . . we have 105 families at last count who are asking for food. That is 5 times as many as last year!! So, again cereal and peanut butter are always good! Collection boxes are located at the church in the vestibule by the office.
