

From the Pastor's Desk

In a recent article in Plough Quarterly, Philip Britts writes: "When the wise men, or the kings, came from the East, they went to Jerusalem, the capital, to inquire, 'Where is he who has been born King of the Jews?' And today those who are 'wise' make the same mistake in looking to worldly power to solve the world's problems." In Mary's Magnificat she speaks of the Lord as One who "has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly." Jesus calls the poor and the humble blessed while warning of woes to the rich and powerful, yet still we look to the rich and powerful as measures of success and to violence and the threat of violence as a valid means to impose our will on other nations and people. We are still looking for the savior among the powerful in Jerusalem instead of among the poor in Bethlehem!

In her sermon at the National Cathedral on Monday, January 21st (which I highly commend to you), Right Reverend Mariann Edgar Budde, an Episcopal bishop, spoke of the importance of unity for our nation as we look to the future.

# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK (contd)

- **respect** for others, for we ALL are created in the image of God
- honesty in our words and relationships rooted in God's command "You shall not bear false witness" and the Golden Rule
- humility, as proclaimed by the prophet Micah (What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love kindness/ mercy, and walk humbly with your God!) and by Jesus (Those who exalt themselves will be humbled and those who humble themselves will be exalted).

Rev. Budde's encouragement to the president to show mercy draws on the beatitude (Blessed are the merciful) and the biblical imperative to be merciful toward others because God has shown mercy to us. Her message was well grounded in Scripture and faithful to Christ's call to us as disciples. Those Christians who take issue with her words would do well to read their Bibles, for they may find that their argument is less with her than with the prophets and Jesus who express God's will for our lives and life together. Within some corners of the evangelical community this reality has resulted in some pastors being castigated for reading portions of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount – not for interpreting those passages, but simply for reading Jesus' words which they describe as "woke" and "weak" and "unrealistic", but which we who claim to be Jesus' disciples call "faithful."

Jesus calls us to be countercultural – to love when the world says, "Hate!"; to forgive when the world says, "Get even!"; to strive to be rich in soul rather than rich in things; to be humble when the world says, "Look at me!" It wasn't easy in the 1st century, and it is no easier today. It is what some have called radical grace and radical love. In that light, may we all be so radical – and thus be faithful!

# Missionary UPDATE

What does your January look like? Here at Decapolis, we are already in full swing—collecting manure and green and brown organic material for compost piles, building compost piles, and setting up our training calendar for 2025.

Last year, with your support, we and over 1,000 farmers in more than 50 communities produced 45 tons of organic fertilizer, helping families to have healthier, more productive crops with

little to no input cost. Our goal this year is to reach



10,000 small-scale Nigerian farmers with training in regenerative agriculture and wise money management, while sharing with them the redemptive message of the Gospel. We are excited to see all of the requests coming in and for the many opportunities to partner with other ministries and various communities across the country. However, such partnerships do bring their own challenges. In Nigeria, the broken, Western-aide system has contributed to the cycle of poverty, hunger, and dependency. What we are offering is sustainability, which is a threat to dependency. That means that the very help and empowerment we are offering can be seen as a threat.

We are grateful for the guidance and support of Equipping Farmers International, and we ask for prayers for wisdom and discernment, as well as strength for the year ahead. "Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and He shall establish your plans." ~ Proverbs 16:3

Valentine's Day – favorite holiday for those of us with a sweet tooth – is almost here. Conversation hearts, red and pink-frosted baked goodies. Boxes of chocolates. Oh yum. Oh dear. Those sweets probably contain Red Dye #3, recently banned as a carcinogen that can exacerbate hyperactivity/attention deficits in sensitive children. On Jan.15, the FDA revoked "the authorized uses in food and ingested drugs of FD&C Red No. 3." Manufacturers must remove it from food by Jan. 2027, and medicines by Jan. 2028.

Red Dye #3 (erythrosine) is a petroleum-based additive used to give foods and medicines their bright red color. In 1990, the FDA banned its use in cosmetics, citing studies showing it caused cancer in rats. In 1992, the agency declared its intention to ban Red #3 from food, but ...."decided not to take action." In 1994, the European Union banned #3, except in candied cherries. (Japan, China, the United Kingdom, Australia and New Zealand have also banned Red #3.) Almost twenty years later, in 2012, the Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry concluded that as many as eight percent of all children (are) affected by food colorings." It was another two decades before consumer groups and scientists were able to pressure the FDA into action. (Meanwhile, California passed its own laws prohibiting the use of #3 in foods made or sold there.)

"(Although) the FDA has been aware for years that petroleum-based artificial colorant has been shown to cause cancer in animals... (and) linked (it) to hyperactivity and other neurobehavioral effects in children ...." food and drug industries used more than 200,000 pounds of Red 3 in 2021, the Center for Science in the Public Interest (CSPI) noted. The FDA itself estimates that U.S. children between the ages of 2 and 5 consume twice as much Red Dye #3 as the American public, by body weight.

Meanwhile, Red Dye #3 remains an additive in more than 2,000 of our foods and medicines, including breakfast cereals, sprinkles, candies, icings, sodas, ice cream and frozen yogurt treats, various fruit and veggie juices, cookies, vegan meats, sausage, bacon and other processed meats. Medicines containing Red Dye #3 include: Gummy vitamins, Omeprazole, Gabapentin, Phentermine, cough syrups and some forms of acetaminophen.

In an effort to phase out #3, some manufacturers use natural extracts derived from fruits, vegetables and seeds. More common, though, is to substitute Red Dye #40 (Allura Red). Despite studies showing it can cause DNA disruptions, hyperactivity and allergic reactions, #40 is currently included in more than 36,000 products -- including Vyvanse, often prescribed to treat ADHD. Recent research also suggests that Yellow #5 (tartrazine) may cause hyperactivity and neurotoxicity in children.

What's a consumer to do? Aldi's has eliminated all artificial dyes from its brand. The Good Housekeeping Institute has published a comprehensive list of products including #3 and #40, but honestly? Your best bet is to read labels.
