From the Pastor's Desk

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. DEI. Those words have become lightning rods in our nation and are anathema to the current administration that seems intent on punishing any organization or individuals that try to address issues around DEI. The terms mean different things to different people; for some they are essential to being a better nation as we grapple with a legacy of discrimination that cannot just be wished away! For others DEI focuses too much on the past and holds us back from being the nation they envision us being.

I chaired the DEI committee at the hospital which was formed to address health disparities identified in the COVID epidemic. In fulfilling our mission to care for the whole community, we found that within our larger community there were diverse communities that had different health needs and outcomes for a variety of reasons. For some, transportation was an issue; for some rural communities, lack of internet access made telehealth a problem; for some, language was a barrier, while for others it was stigma associated with their circumstances that proved a barrier to seeking care. DEI work helped us better understand the issues of individuals within those communities and find solutions to improve the health of folks in all the communities within our community. People could have better health outcomes and costs could be saved by understanding and meeting the particular needs of individuals before untreated health problems landed them in the ER! It was a win-win for the community!

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK (cont'd)

For Christians, DEI is at the heart of the Gospel. In the creation stories in Genesis, God makes clear that the **diversity** of creation is a good thing to be celebrated. Paul lifts up the diversity of spiritual gifts as a blessing to be cherished, not lamented. All gifts are important without exalting one over the others. At times such diversity provoked fear of "the other" who is different; Jesus broke down those barriers and calls us to repent of our own prejudices and actions that fail to recognize our common creation as children of God.

Equity is fairness. Jesus goes out of his way to emphasize that fairness may demand more than equal treatment. Sinners great and small are forgiven. The prodigal son is loved and welcomed home by the same father who seeks out the loyal son who stayed by his father's side. The rich are to share with the poor, and the stranger is to be welcomed as a neighbor. "The first shall be last and the last first" may sound unfair to our ears, but in God's eyes it illustrates how God's priorities differ so radically from those of the world. Jesus is interested in persons where they are with a view toward all being saved, recognizing that may involve helping different people in different ways.

Throughout his ministry, Jesus emphasizes **inclusion** – welcoming those on the margins of society, showing love toward those considered unlovable, including those who were excluded by the religious, cultural, and political powers. God's love is an inclusive love for all! And repeatedly Jesus encourages us to repent of the sins of the past, not ignore them, and commit to a better future together as God's faithful people.

We who are called to be Jesus' disciples are called to practice God's kind of DEI – in Micah's words: to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God; to love God with all that we are and to love all our neighbors as ourselves. Maybe that is not the way you have thought of DEI; but if you would be Jesus' disciple, then you ought to embrace God's DEI with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love – regardless of what the political powers may say! For, at the heart of God's DEI and Jesus' calling is love – love for God and for our neighbors, one and all!

We are so excited, and here's why!
March 17, 2025
kicked off the very first Decapolis/EFI
Nigeria 5-day training of trainers!
This group of 19 farmers successfully implemented the regenerative agriculture training they received in 2023 and 2024

and were selected to continue their path to becoming certified trainers. After a long week of review of the basics, additional training in alternative crops and vegetable gardening, lessons on asset-based development and agriculture as ministry, and opportunities in the field and in the classroom to practice teaching, they all received their International Certificate in Conservation Agriculture from Dordt University. The final step in their journey to becoming independent trainers will be for each of them to co-host a training or two with us. This is the beginning of the next phase of our ministry – allowing us to reach all of Nigeria – more effectively and efficiently – with regenerative agriculture and the redemptive message of Christ. This will also help to ease the burden of training on us and give us the opportunity to begin developing our permanent project site and building up other aspects of the ministry. We are so grateful for your prayers, encouragement and support during this growth, and we ask that you also keep all our new and upcoming extension workers in your prayers as well. 

WARM Shelter Report

We were prepared to serve Three days of breakfast, lunch and dinner (9 meals for 30 people = 270 planned and provisioned meals).

Covenant volunteers included:

- 20 Covenant members who planned to prepare and serve meals
- 22 Covenant members who provided foods for breakfasts and lunches and dinners

Unfortunately for us, the WARM Shelter closed Friday morning, March 29 instead of Monday, March 31. We were unable to serve six meals.

However, we were able to give all the donated foods to the VALLEY MISSION, where it was graciously and gratefully accepted.

Dad gum it. Mom was right again: Chewing gum is not a good idea. A pilot study released last week indicates that as many as 637 microplastics per gram (about one stick) might be released when chewing either synthetic or plant-based gums. (Brand names were not noted.) Researchers found four main plastics in participants' saliva, with polyolefin being the most common. Although polyolefin is FDA-approved as "food-safe" and used as shrink warp for meats and other foods, studies have indicated that Micro plastics have begun to breach the blood-brain barrier, with as-yet-unknown long-term effects. But we needn't worry too much – yet -- the project's principal investigator assures us. "Scientists don't know if

microplastics are unsafe to (people) or not. But we know we are exposed to plastics in everyday life, and that's what we wanted to examine here."

Skin cancer alert. Sunlight is good for our physical and mental health. It also causes

all sorts of problems, including cancer in spots we don't normally expect. In addition to the "usual suspect" spots – face, outer ears, scalp, arms, back, and chest – WebMD suggests checking under your fingernails, eyelids, tongue, and lips. The whites of your eyes – as well as your irises - may also be affected. Other spots include your inner ear, the soles of your feet, and the palms of your hands. We all "know," of course, to be faithful in our use of a broad-spectrum sunscreen with 30+ SPF. But even with sunscreen, many common medi-

cines cause photosensitivity. Included: NSAIDs like Naproxen (ibuprofen, however, is OK); anything with Retin-A, digretics like HCTZ; sulfonyluregs used in diabetes treatment; amiodarone for heart arrhythmias; medicines with quinine; Claritin and other antihistamines. A more comprehensive list can be found at GoodRx or Drugs.com. The American Academy of Dermatology Association (AAD) recommends annual dermatology visits starting in our early 20s. AAD has several excellent, downloadable "infographics" on topics ranging from "How to SPOT Skin Cancer" to a "Mole Map" and "How to Select Sunscreens." Find them at:

At the National Institute for Aging (NIA), a polite voicemail promised a quick call back. (I'm still waiting) At the CDC, someone answered but insisted I was "media" and needed to email questions – and to expect a two-week wait for responses. At the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), a real person answered and told me printed

materials are not currently available – and no one knows when the problem will be sorted – but I was welcome to call back and check anytime during business hours.


