

From the Pastor's Desk

In his biography And There Was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle, Jon Meacham writes: "[P]olitics divorced from conscience is fatal to the American experiment in liberty under law." In the difficult decisions that Lincoln had to make across his life, he sought to do the right thing as he perceived it and as he believed God willed it. Yet he was aware that there were others who opposed him who were also guided by their consciences, albeit with different values, and reached different conclusions. He believed that history would judge those that proved faithful and those that proved unfaithful. Meacham's point is that if conscience, ethical reflection, is not guiding political decisions, then our democracy is at risk. His comment called to mind the time our son Dan was asked by a high school teacher to write a paragraph about what he was most afraid of; he wrote, "Intelligent people who lack morals." I think that is something we all should fear!

What then are the morals that should stir our consciences as Christians as we consider the policies and actions of our government and its leaders? Lincoln's opposition to slavery was grounded in the biblical testimony that all people were created in God's image and the affirmation of the Declaration of Independence that "All men are created equal and endowed by their creator with certain inalienable rights" including "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." He found slavery repugnant to those values, though politically he was slow to use the power of the presidency to enact change. His morals were also grounded in the Golden Rule: Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK (contd)

He found it untenable that anyone would want to be enslaved and have his labors enrich others, and so saw slavery as a violation of that Golden Rule.

As Christians, those two biblical precepts: our common creation in the image of God and the Golden Rule should be the basis for our moral judgments as well. The Great Commandment to love God with all that we are and to love our neighbor as ourselves should be front and center. Micah's call to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God is a clear call to ethical behavior. Perhaps there are others that resonate for you as well. But do you live into those demands day to day and, to return to Meacham's point, do they shape your politics and expectations for our government and its leaders?

Clearly, the treatment of immigrants across our nation fails to meet those ethical standards. The recent legislation granting tax breaks to the rich at the expense of health care for the poor fails that moral test. Failing to care for the environment violates our call to be stewards of creation. Those are a few examples, but my larger point is this: our ethics as Christians should not be set aside in the political arena. They should guide the policies and candidates we support; they should shape our expectations and demands of government and its leaders. Our Christian faith is the lens through which we should look at all of life - without exception! And where we see inconsistencie's, we should speak up and demand better. That is not always easy; sometimes values clash and leave us uncertain as to what faithfulness demands. But faithfulness should not be set aside for political expediency if we are to be the disciples Jesus calls us to be. May you be such a disciple, and together máy we be such a nation!

NOMINATIONS FOR ELDERS

Our Book of Order tells us this about the office of Elder:

As there were in the Old Testament times elders for the government of the people, so the New Testament church provided persons with particular gifts to share in governing and ministry. Ruling Elders are chosen by the people. Together with Teaching Elders (Ministers of the Word and Sacrament), they exercise leadership, governance, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibility for the life of a congregation, as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships. They serve faithfully as members of the Session and should be persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel, both within the church and in the world. Additionally, the church makes provision for youth who may be called to serve as youth elders to serve a one-year term, if so called.

Where Seed to Tail begins is in the land. Our own backyard is the source for many of the ingredients in the kitchen and products in the Market. We grow from seed (a portion of our namesake) vegetables, flowers, and herbs from spring to fall. While each year we are expanding our production, we rely heavily on partnerships with other local farmers to enhance the procurement of fresh ingredients for our daily menu year round.

Our organic and regenerative approach allows the Restaurant and Farm to feed each other. Soil health is a necessity for growing nutritious vegetables. The chickens play an important part in creating a natural fertilizer for the garden along with their delicious eggs for our family and the Market. The chickens benefit from tasty treats from the Restaurant's food scraps, which are also used in our compost bin and worm farm. This all then feeds back into the soil to help the garden grow the veggies you find on your plate. With pollinating help from our neighbor's bee hives and use of rainwater collection, we hope to keep this symbiotic relationship blooming for years to come.


